

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"Trekka" is Back in Victoria to Stay

"Trekka" arrived back in her birthplace at the end of September. This 20½ foot yawl was built by John Guzzwell in the back of a fish and chip shop in downtown Victoria. She was the first Canadian and, at the time, the smallest yacht to make a single handed circumnavigation, which was completed in 1959. "Trekka" again followed a similar route around the world in the mid 1960's under the guidance of a California couple. A change of ownership gave her a change from ocean voyaging to cruising in Hawaii. She was then sold and sailed to Victoria by her Hawaiian owner, Abronovich, making his first offshore voyage. The new owner is the Thermopylae Club of Victoria which will put her in the Victoria Maritime Museum.

We will probably have a chance to see "Trekka" on one of the fund-raising visits to boat shows and yacht clubs. The first circumnavigation is interestingly documented in Guzzwell's book "Trekka Around the World."



SAFETY AFLOAT

From the basic unit of life, the cell, our body is made up of tissue, organs, systems, and a complex structure of bones. Twenty-four hours a day our body protects itself from hazards to the best of its ability. From the moment we arise, we have some control and a responsibility to protect ourselves.

One of the marvels of our body is that it can, to some extent, alert us to danger, but people ignore the warnings and take chances. Maybe this is due to the very early experience we had when we first learned to walk. We had a great time crawling around. The world around us was full of wonder. Our parents wanted us to walk while what we wanted to do was crawl--it was safer. Then we took our very own first steps and fell down. Crawling was really the only way to travel. With persistence from our parents we gained confidence on our feet. We couldn't get around any faster, but we could reach higher. Our body still told us that it was safer to crawl, and sometimes we had the bruises to prove it.

As we became older we found that, in order to expand our travel, we had to walk and after all, we had mastered a new trick, standing on solid ground.

Now many years later, our feet firmly on terra firma, we give little thought to those early days. Our body has conquered many obstacles and now we want to go boating. All the years on solid ground are now foreign. Beneath us now is an unstable boat. What we have learned no longer applies, our sense of balance does not work as well.....really our body says to crawl and hang on. This, then, is body protection.


The first safety lesson is to understand and act on our responsibility and to think safety.

Boater's Special

1 can cling peach halves
1 tsp. salt
1/2 lb. bacon slices, cut in half
4 cups elbow macaroni

1/2 lb. shredded cheddar cheese
1 medium onion, chopped
1/4 tsp. garlic salt

Drain peaches, reserving syrup. Add water to the syrup to make 4 cups liquid. Add salt to mixture. Fry bacon in large skillet until partially done, then remove half the bacon. Add half the macaroni, half the cheese, and chopped onion; add reserved bacon and macaroni, and all but 1/2 cup cheddar cheese. Pour syrup mixture over all. Cover and cook over low heat for 1 hour. Remove cover and stir in remaining cheese. Add peach halves. Bake 10 to 15 minutes longer, or until peaches are hot.
Yield: 6 to 8 servings.

Local Log Racer Goes International

Wes Wensley and his crew were the only Canadians invited to this year's North American Predicted Log Racing Championships. Thirteen trawler type cruisers took part in the 30 mile race held offshore from the Marina del Rey (Los Angeles) in mid-August. Wes said that the boat traffic was rather heavy near the breakwater of this home port of about 6000 boats. The race was quite different from the usual. Several of the turning points out in the ocean were identified only by latitude and longitude. The race committee's observer, the only one aboard to have a timepiece, gave a 3 minute countdown on which to establish the boat's expected arrival at the designated turning point. The time at the next checkpoint really showed up piloting inaccuracies. All this after being allowed 4 hours for plotting and calculations!

Wes' crew of two other local log racers came in last with a 3% error, whereas the winner had a 1.6% error. This narrow spread indicates the keenness of the competition. All crews were well entertained by the Southern California Cruiser Association.

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Helpful Hints

Keeping Jack Frost off Windows

The problem of ice covered windows can be solved by adding 1/2 cup rubbing alcohol or anti-freeze to each quart of water used.

Rub the inside of windows with a sponge that has been dipped in rubbing alcohol or anti-freeze. Polish with paper towels or newspaper.

Try a cloth moistened with glycerine--rub on leaving a little of the glycerine on the inside of the glass.
