It all started at the 1966 Vancouver Boat Show when a casual inquiry at the C.P.S. booth confirmed that for \$ 20.00 one could take an Elementary Piloting course. After having completed the 66/67 course in Richmond, Tony found the \$ 10.00 to join Fraser. He was immediately put to work by Cdr. Lou Durant as Squadron PRO for which he earned his very first merit mark.

Executive meetings in those days consisted of about 10 men sitting around a smoke-filled Legion Hall (a deteriorating old shack) in Ladner, passing around a couple of cases of beer. My! How things have changed.

Over the next two years, Tony stayed on the executive and took Seamanship and A.P. for which he had to drive to Vancouver. Full of theory he now decided it was safe to buy his first large (18 foot outboard) boat but soon traded up to a larger boat to accommodate his wife, Marilyn, and 3 small children.

1970-71 saw Tony as Assistant Training Officer and the instructor of his first Elementary Piloting Course. Working up through the positions of Training Officer and Executive Officer, he became Fraser's 10th Commander in 1973-74. He remembered the Graduation Party of 1974 when one of our more stalwart members had to eject physically a menacing drunk just prior to dinner.

Both Fraser and PMD called upon Tony to be their Marep Officer for a two-year term. In addition to his 14 years of executive duties he has successfully completed all CPS courses except Marine Electronics and Navigator as well as instructing for five winters. He instructed the 1974-75 Weather class for Fraser and then wrote the exam with his students.

Tony still marvels at the supportive group that is Fraser. From executive meetings to marking homework there is always someone who will say, "Hey, I can do that for you." It is a fantastic value for the money it costs, and is rewarding in the friendships made.

#### CANADIAN COAST GUARD AUXILIARY

Working behind the scene, and with a minimum of fanfare is a group of boaters who have volunteered their vessels and expertise to augment and assist the Canadian Coast Guard.

This organization had its beginning in Ladner. A boating accident in October 1975 in the south arm of the Fraser River which resulted in a double drowning prompted a meeting of Delta Council, the Delta Chamber of Commerce, the Canadian Coast Guard, the local M.P. and MLA as well as concerned citizens. Delta was granted the privilege of forming a pilot Coast Guard Auxiliary Unit, and training of some 20 volunteers began.

The merits of having such an organization were soon recognized, and by early 1977 plans were being formulated for an auxiliary on a national basis. In October of 1978, an agreement was signed between the auxiliarists (incorporated as Canadian Marine Rescue Auxiliary or C.M.R.A.) and the Minister of Transport, Otto Lang, officially establishing the organization now known as the Canadian Coast Guard Auxiliary.

Enough history; at present the Auxiliary here on the West Coast is comprised of 23 units at various locations. The number in each unit varies from 5 to 20 members with a total membership of 251. This consists of 177 vessel owners, 64 crew, and 10 communicators. Value of the 177 vessels is approximately \$10,000,000. Unit 02, here in Ladner has 28 members; 18 of these are vessel owners. They operate a Coast Guard Zodiac as well.

The Auxiliarists are required to take training in such subjects as Search and Rescue, First Aid, CPR, Radio Operations, and towing techniques. Practice exercises are also carried out. Each Auxiliary vessel is required to undergo an annual inspection by the Coast Guard to ensure that it is properly equipped and seaworthy. Coast Guard Auxiliary vessels may be identified by the distinctive pennant they fly and by the familiar "Rescue" signs on the sides of the vessels.

It is significant to note that in 1980 CCG Auxiliarists participated in some 375 incidents. The local unit (Unit #02) was involved in 41 of these. In 1981 the total was 213, with Unit 02 involved in 25. As quite a number of these incidents consisted of responding to vessel breakcowns and other similar non-urgent situations, it meant that the primary Search and Rescue facilities were freed and available to respond to the urgent and genuine emergency incidents. Future plans call for more involvement by Auxiliarists in Safe Boating public relations work and courtesy vessel inspections.

Here are a few "Did you know's" on the Gulf Islands--

Tent Island--Part of the Kuper Island Indian Reserve, this lovely anchorage and camping site has been closed to the boating public. A Provincial Government permit allowing boaters use of the Island has expired and the Government has not renewed the permit.

Sidney Spit--if you are hoping for a swim this is not the place. Water temperature here is  $10^{\circ}$ F. colder than most other waters in the Gulf Islands; only the very young or very brave enjoy it.

As one of the marine parks with moorage fees, you are required to self-register your boat. Fees can only be submitted on a daily basis so if you plan an extended stay come prepared with small bills, as the ranger does not have change.

- Receive applications for boating courses from advertising program.
- Visit classes on opening night and supervise enrollment.
- Visit various classes.
- Arrange for Examinations.
- Arrange for markers.
- Notify successful graduates.
- Advise Squadron Commander of persons deserving merit marks.
- Prepare report for change of watch.
- Ensure certificates and lists of successful elective and advanced course students.
- Make a list of new members who have offered assistance.
