
THANKS TO THE PHONING COMMITTEE

1981-1982 Annual Training Report

This year has been successful for the Training Department of Fraser Squadron. A good slate of courses was offered.

The Basic Boating course in September was held in both Ladner and Richmond. 61 wrote the exam in April, and 59 passed. 12 wrote the exam in December after the accelerated course, and all passed, for a total 95% pass rate, which is again above the national average. I believe it has to do with our high calibre of instructors.

For the first time, Fraser offered an accelerated Basic Boating Course after Christmas. February 15, 1982 registration found us swamped with students. 164 students registered and caught the training department by surprise, but with lots of luck and minor arm twisting, Fraser's members came through again, instructors and proctors volunteered, and all has gone well. February classes will be writing exams on May 3, 1982.

Advanced classes were run with the following results:

Seamanship Power - 7 wrote and passed Seamanship Sail - 8 wrote and 7 passed Advanced Piloting - 10 wrote and 8 passed Marine Maintenance - 5 wrote and passed Junior Navigator to write 1 exam on May 15, 1982.

The Local Knowledge course is in progress at this time with 47 students taking part.

I would like to thank my complete training department—Carol Quartermain, A.T.O. Richmond classes, Lindsay Smith, A.F.O. Advanced courses, all the instructors, proctors, guest lecturers, John Lewisch, training aids, Linda Gisborne, Squadron secretary, and our able and resourceful supply officer, Martin Hoffman.

I would also like to thank the Executive and members of Fraser Squadron for their support, advice, and overflowing help at registrations, exam markings, and at any other time needed.

DID YOU KNOW?

The basic fault leading to the greatest number of fires in boats is corrosion of fuel tanks. Even stainless steel will corrode quite rapidly under conditions that could be found in your boat.

Plastic fuel lines, hoses of rubber-like material, and plastic sediment bowls are real hazards even though they are free of leaks. A small nearby fire may cause them to soften and leak or burn themselves so that the boat's fuel can be released into the fire.

Fuel is getting dirtier so watch the fuel filters; they may now need more frequent changing than in the past.

The two devices that have been suspected as the major sources of ignition in many boating fires are the ignition distributor and the starter.

SPRING FITTING-OUT by G. Jamieson

For poats stored in the water do your spring tune up now. Ensure that the batteries are fully charged. All pelts and hoses should be checked and replaced if they are hard or cracked. Connect all the hoses and put back all drain plugs. The engine can now be started and checked for leaks in the exhaust system, the fuel system and the lubricating oil system.

For boats stored dry, the procedure is the same except that it will be necessary to install fresh fuel and a fully charged battery. The propeller shaft in a wooden hull should be checked for alignment a day or two after launching. Be sure to check the hydraulic connections of an in-out drive and refill the leg with new oil.

Before launching, paint the bottom, close all seacocks, and install all drain plugs. Clean the boat and be ready for some good boating.
